


Just Arrived


The New York Design Center, Studio Four, and Greenwich Village


D and D Building, The Sanderson Showroom, and Lillian Nassau

The Metropolitan Museum of Art

We also got to see some larger extraordinary Tiffany pieces that were so amazing and details. I can't imagine how long they must have taken. To top it off, we got to see the phenomenal Karl Lagerfeld display, showing many of his pieces throughout his years.
